Curious about integrating environmental education concepts in your college courses? See how these professors use EE to teach science concepts and educational pedagogy in their natural resources and pre-service courses. Registration required. This will be recorded.

Dr. Haines taught middle school science prior to teaching at Towson University, where she has been for 23 years. Her courses for preservice teachers all include outdoor components, and many include service learning. She often teaches her classes off campus at local organizations, including at the Maryland Zoo, Irvine Nature Center, Oregon Ridge Nature Center, and the National Aquarium.

Dr. Stephens Williams taught EE and Land Use Planning courses at Southern Illinois University, and courses such as Human Dimensions, Forest Recreation, and Teacher Conservation at the University of Arkansas - Monticello. She then worked as a natural resource consultant, which included projects such as teaching natural resource topics to formal and non-formal educators, pre-service and in-service natural resource professionals. She currently is researching or advising on topics such as visitor management, issue investigation and/or evaluation, and teaching courses on Human Dimensions and Communications.
