

Regional Species of Greatest Conservation Need

In 2022, the Northeast Fish and Wildlife Diversity Technical Committee (NEFWDTC) identified 11 species of turtles as Regional Species of Greatest Conservation Need (RSGCN) in the Northeast and two species as Watchlist. Four of these species have both high regional responsibility and high or very high regional concern. Through this process, the northern population of the bog turtle was identified as one of the highest-priority species.

Many of these species have been the focus of regional conservation efforts, coordinated by states and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS), to help prevent further population declines and the need for a listing under the federal Endangered Species Act.

TITLE 21--FOOD AND DRUGS CHAPTER I--FOOD AND DRUG ADMINISTRATION DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

SUBCHAPTER L - REGULATIONS UNDER CERTAIN OTHER ACTS ADMINISTERED BY THE FOOD AND DRUG ADMINISTRATION

PART 1240 -- CONTROL OF COMMUNICABLE DISEASES

Subpart D - Specific Administrative Decisions Regarding Interstate Shipments

Sec. 1240.62 Turtles intrastate and interstate requirements.

- (a) *Definition*. As used in this section the term "turtles" includes all animals commonly known as turtles, tortoises, terrapins, and all other animals of the order Testudinata, class Reptilia, except marine species (families Dermachelidae and Chelonidae).
- (b) Sales; general prohibition. Except as otherwise provided in this section, viable turtle eggs and live turtles with a carapace length of less than 4 inches shall not be sold, held for sale, or offered for any other type of commercial or public distribution.
- (c) Exceptions. The provisions of this section are not applicable to:
- (1) The sale, holding for sale, and distribution of live turtles and viable turtle eggs for bona fide scientific, educational, or exhibitional purposes, other than use as pets.
- (2) The sale, holding for sale, and distribution of live turtles and viable turtle eggs not in connection with a business.
- (3) The sale, holding for sale, and distribution of live turtles and viable turtle eggs intended for export only, provided that the outside of the shipping package is conspicuously labeled "For Export Only."
- (4) Marine turtles excluded from this regulation under the provisions of paragraph (a) of this section and eggs of such turtles.
- (d) *Petitions*. The Commissioner of Food and Drugs, either on his own initiative or on behalf of any interested person who has submitted a petition, may publish a proposal to amend this regulation. Any such petition shall include an adequate factual basis to support the petition, and will be published for comment if it contains reasonable grounds for the proposed regulation. A petition requesting such a regulation, which would amend this regulation, shall be submitted to the Division of Dockets Management, Food and Drug Administration, 5630 Fishers Lane, rm. 1061, Rockville, MD 20852.

15.2 Collection and Possession of Reptiles and Amphibians.

15.2.1 Unless otherwise provided by law or regulation of the Department, it shall be unlawful for any person to remove from the wild or possess any native reptile or amphibian species, their eggs or parts without a permit from the Director.

(1)**15.2.2** Notwithstanding subsection 15.1.1 of this section, one individual of each of the following species or subspecies of reptiles and amphibians, may be collected and possessed without a permit.

- **1-A. Permit required.** Except as otherwise provided in this Part, a person may not import wildlife into or possess wildlife in the State or receive or possess wildlife imported into the State. The department shall maintain a list of unregulated fish and wildlife species for which a permit under this section is not required that is available to the public. Each day a person violates this subsection that person commits a Class E crime for which a minimum fine of \$50 and an amount equal to twice the applicable permit fee must be imposed. The commissioner may grant a permit to introduce, import, transport, receive or possess fish or gametes in accordance with the provisions of section 12509.
- **1-B. Exemption.** Notwithstanding subsection 1-A, a reptile, amphibian or invertebrate that is native to the State and not listed by the department as threatened or endangered or as a species of special concern may be captured from the wild in the State and possessed without a permit. Possession limits for each species are as follows:
 - A. Amphibians, up to 5 specimens of each species; [PL 2017, c. 205, §15 (NEW).]
 - B. Reptiles, up to 2 specimens of each species; and [PL 2017, c. 205, §15 (NEW).]

Possession includes the keeping, holding, or restricting of wildlife as defined in RSA 207:1. Includes eggs or progeny thereof.

The following species (Spotted Turtle (*Clemmys guttata*), Blanding's Turtle (*Emydoidea blandingii*), Wood Turtle (*Glyptemys insculpta*), Eastern (woodland) Box Turtle (*Terrapene carolina carolina*), or any egg or part thereof) **shall not be possessed** without an appropriate permit: (FIS 804.02; to request a permit see instructions under FIS 804.04).

NOTE: No permit to possess shall be issued if there is any disease, genetic, ecological, environmental, health, safety or welfare risks to the public or other wildlife species.

The only turtle species for which there is an open hunting season is the Snapping Turtle. You may not harvest, take, or possess any other native turtle species at any time without a permit.

Regulations:

- It is unlawful to take, catch, kill or possess for the purposes of selling or offering for sale, importing or exporting for consideration, trading or bartering or purchasing an amphibian or reptile whether dead or alive, in whole or in parts, including the eggs or any life stage that was taken from lands or waters within this Commonwealth.
- It is unlawful to transport or import into or within this Commonwealth a native species from another jurisdiction. It is also unlawful to receive a native species that was transported or imported into or within this Commonwealth from another jurisdiction.
- (1)The daily bag limit for snapping turtles is 15 and season limit is 30. The season is July 1 through October 31.

- Possession of Red Eared Slider Turtles. No person other than a bona fide researcher, or a
 licensed pet shop and their transportation carriers shall import any Red-eared Slider turtles
 (*Trachemys scripta elegans*). All persons other than a bona fide researcher, or a licensed pet
 shops and their transportation agents are prohibited from possessing Red Eared Slider turtles
 unless they are kept indoors as pets in a manner that will prevent their escape or liberation into
 the wild. Keeping of these animals in any type of outdoor enclosure is prohibited.
- The only species of reptiles and amphibians for which there is an open season are Snapping Turtle (*Chelydra serpentina*), Green Frog (*Lithobates clamitans*), and Bullfrog (*Lithobates catesbeianus*). The possession, removal from the wild, or killing, for any purpose, of any other native reptile or amphibian to include their nests and eggs is prohibited except by special permit.

Possession limits. Except as otherwise provided for in § 29.1-418 of the Code of Virginia, 4VAC15-20-130, 4VAC15-320-40, and the sections of this chapter, it shall be lawful to capture and possess live for private use and not for sale or export no more than one individual of any native or naturalized, as defined in 4VAC15-20-50, species of amphibian or reptile per physical address, and 20 individuals of any

single native or naturalized (as defined in 4VAC15-20-50) species of aquatic invertebrate and nongame fish unless specifically listed in this subsection.

- 1.1. These regulations establish open seasons and possession limits for reptiles and amphibians in West Virginia. The take or possession of any native West Virginia reptile or amphibian species not listed hereafter is prohibited pursuant to W.Va. Code 20-2-4.
- 3.2. It is unlawful to take or possess any reptile or amphibian from any area under agreement with, owned, controlled, or administered by the Division of Natural Resources, except pursuant to subsections 3.2.1. and 3.2.2. of this rule.
- 4.5. A person may take and possess a daily creel limit of 10 Eastern Spiny Softshell (*Apalone s. spinifera*) and Snapping Turtle (*Chelydra s. serpentina*) and the possession limit in aggregate is 20 for these species of turtles.
