Dear Chairwoman Murkowski and Senator Udall:

We are writing to express our support for the State and Tribal Wildlife Grants Program. We appreciate your past support and hope that you will continue to back the program by providing the highest level of funding possible. The State and Tribal Wildlife Grants Program is a critical investment that is needed to sustain our nation's most vulnerable fish and wildlife. In FY 2017, \$62.571 million was appropriated for the program. We ask that you provide the most robust funding possible for FY 2018.

The State and Tribal Wildlife Grants Program is the nation's core program to prevent fish and wildlife from becoming endangered. It has been successful in preventing endangered species listings. The program funds monitoring and on-the-ground conservation such as invasive species control, habitat management, species reintroduction, and disease surveillance that directly address threats to declining species.

The State and Tribal Wildlife Grants program is the only federal grant program available to the states, territories, District of Columbia and tribes to conserve more than 12,000 fish and wildlife that are in greatest need of conservation. Without consistent funding, more species will be added to the endangered species list requiring costly and often controversial interventions. With the number of petitions for federal threatened and endangered species listing up by over 1,000% in the last decade, this funding is more important than ever to fulfill the shared federal-state and tribal responsibility for sustaining our nation's fish and wildlife.

The State and Tribal Wildlife Grants program is the principal source of funding to implement State Wildlife Action Plans. These plans were revised last year to incorporate the newest science and data so fish and wildlife professionals can address the needs of declining fish and wildlife. Input from thousands of our nation's leading scientists, conservationists, and concerned citizens contributed to these plans so they can effectively lead voluntary proactive fish and wildlife conservation. The State and Tribal Wildlife Grants program benefits over 90 million citizens who participate in hunting, fishing, photography, hiking, and other forms of wildlife-related recreation. These and other outdoor recreationists contribute \$646 billion to our economy each year.

We understand that the nation's debt and economic situation are an important concern. However, investment in the State and Tribal Wildlife Grants program saves taxpayers' money by reducing the high cost of recovery when species are added to the federal threatened and endangered species list and reduces regulatory uncertainty to businesses.

We urge the Subcommittee on Interior, Environment, and Related Agencies to provide the most robust funding possible for the State and Tribal Wildlife Grants Program in fiscal year 2018 so that these important wildlife conservation efforts can continue.
